

June 23, 1852. A long letter from Augustine Heard, Jr. to his mother at Ipswich, Mass. It is headed "On board Steamer 'Malta'/ June 23, 1852. He gives her some interesting points, inter alia, "It is a beautiful day, and we are heaving in the long swells of the Indian ocean. The sun is shining brightly and the sky of that most delicate light, vapor charged blue of the tropics have with its floating web-like clouds. I had been reading an essay on cloud painting & was stretched under the heavy awning, drowsily watching the changing forms and admiring the contrast between the deep-blue of the sea, here and there streaked with a fleece of foam, and the delicate tint of the sky, when imperceptively and by degrees a spirit of devotion crept upon me, and I found myself actually looking 'through nature of to nature's God.' " He goes on to explain his philosophy on religion and reminising about home.

It is evident that Mr. Heard was a man of means as he was going out to China by the "overland mail", i.e. by steamers and across Egypt, rather than booking a much cheaper passage as a passenger on a sailing vessel. The overland route took him about 93 days, New York to Hong Kong. A sailing vessel, going around the Cape of Good Hope, could take up to 180 days.

The <u>S.S. Malta</u> of the Peninsular & Oriental Steam Navigation Co. had departed from Pointe de Galle, Ceylon on June 22, 1852. Heard's letter was penned only one day out of Galle. The <u>Malta</u> arrived at Hong Kong on August 5, 1852. Based on the <u>Malta</u>'s dates, we can project Mr. Heard's passage from the United States as follows:

The <u>S.S. Canton</u> of the P. & O. Line ran a regular river service working between Hong Kong, Macao, Cumsingmoon and Canton on the Canton River. Among other things, she collected and delivered mail to and from the main line packets at Hong Kong. Arrival of this letter at Canton would have been about August 8.

As noted above, while Augustine Heard penned his letter on the passage out, it did not get mailed to his mother until the clipper ship Atalanta left Canton for New York on December 26, 1852 (which see.)

A letter was inclosed in this cover that had been penned by Augustine Heard, Jr. to his mother at Ipswich, Mass. while he was outbound east by the Overland Mail (across Egypt) in May-August 1852. He did not mail his mother's letter until a favorable "opportunity" arose for a fast passage by a clipper ship.

December 16, 1852. The 1288 ton clipper ship Atalanta, built in 1851 at Baltimore, departed from Canton with a cargo of tea and spices, and with Augustine Heard's letter to his mother aboard. His letter to her, addressed c/o George W. Heard, Ipswich, Mass. was endorsed: p "Atalanta."

CANTON TO NEW YORK

Augustine Heard Correspondence Clipper Ship Atalanta Record Passage of 84 Days

N.Y. Times, March 14, 1853. Shortest India Passage. In noticing the stranding of the clipper-ship Atalanta, 84 days from Canton, outside the Bay, the morning papers of Saturday notice the trip as the shortest ever made from that port to New-York. This is a mistake. We know that it is not the first within 84 days, by at least eight days, and we are not sure that is the second best run.

Some years ago, the ship Natchez, Capt. Waterman, and old New-Orleans and New-York packet with no pretentions to clipper-built, was put into the Canton trade, and made the voyage home in 76 days...

In spite of the Time's remarks about the old Natchez, no corroboration of her trip from Canton to New York in 76 days could be found. final word would seem to be from Cutler, Carl, C. "Greyhounds of the Sea", Pg. 236: Of all the tea ships the Atalanta, under command of Captain Wallace, made the fastest passage from Southern China. She left Canton on the 16th of December, '52, and arrived off New York the 11th of March following. Unfortunately she went on the Roamer [sic] Shoals in thick weather, getting off after some delay without damage, but her time of 84 days was unsurpassed by any of the clippers this

March 11, 1853. Letter rated at New York, Act of 1851, letter not over 2-oz., not exceeding 3000 miles, unpaid at 5¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 7¢ due. Had this letter been sent by steamer on the overland mail route (across Egypt) via Marseilles, the rate would have been 65¢ if under 4-oz., or 75¢ if over 4, but under 2-oz.

A note on the reverse of this letter says, "From my beloved son A. Heard, Jr."

Also marked with a red 3/7, or 3/- x $24 \pm$ $72 \pm$ plus $7 \pm$ x $2 \pm$ 14 \pm or a total of $86 \pm$ representing balance left over for U.S. and Britain.

The writer feared that it would not make connection in time at Marseilles, as he says, inter alia, "This steamer has been detained for the despatches of Lord Lyons, which were not received at the usual time in consequence of the flow of troops from the North into Washington, and we fear our letters by this mail may not reach London in time for the Marseilles Mail of the 10 June (sic)."

The letter was prepaid 57¢ in U.S. stamps for the Dec. 1, 1861 to July 1, 1863 rate per $\frac{1}{2}$ -oz. to China via Marseilles. This rate was divided:

Knowing of the possible delay of Niagara from Boston, the Boston Exchange Office made this letter up in the transatlantic mails to be forwarded to New York for the May 31 sailing of the Hamburg-American Line's Borussia for Southampton. (N.B.: The Borussia did not reach Southampton until June 12.) Accordingly, the Boston Exchange Office marked the letter with the PAID/BOSTON AM. PKT. backstamp and credited Britain only for the British and French transit charges, shown as "36" in red manuscript. However, the R.M.S. Niagara did sail in time from Boston on May 28, with this letter aboard, albeit rated with the wrong credits.

 $\underline{\text{Niagara}}$ arrived at Queenstown June 8, and letter stamped in transit at London June 9 with no adjustment of rate credits (Britain should have gotten 52¢ as sea transit was by British Packet.


